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The Safety, Health and Environment National Authority (SHENA) would like to remind all principals, employers, occupiers, self-employed persons and persons at work to be aware of the risks associated with tree felling works and to take the necessary safety precautions to avoid undesirable incidents. In 2022, there were two (2) fatal incidents caused by the consequences of tree felling works. Though only one of them was classified as a workplace accident, there were common safety issues identified in both cases that led to such fatal incidents.

What is "Tree Felling Work"?

"Tree Felling Work" is when a standing tree or a tree leaning against another tree is felled with the help of equipment such as a chainsaw, an axe or machete (parang) and laid down in the desired place. The removal of branches from standing or fallen trees, including but not limited to cutting to suitable lengths, is defined as "delimbing".

The tree felling and delimbing work can involve significant hazards and risks and may lead to undesirable incidents such as serious bodily injury and even death. Therefore, the work requires proper planning and application of appropriate safety measures, which must be conducted by competent persons only.

What are the common issues?

In light of the above two incidents, the Safety, Health and Environment National Authority (SHENA) would like to draw the attention of everyone to the following common issues that contribute to the occurrence of hazards and risks in any workplace:

- Inadequate work plans and lack of specific safe work procedure;
- Lack of safety training;
- Lack of risk assessment;
- Working alone while carrying out risky work;
- Lack of supervision; and
- Ineffective emergency response plan including first aid and rescue.

All principals, employers, occupiers, self-employed persons and persons at work are hereby reminded to comply at all times with the Workplace Safety and Health Order, 2009 and its regulations.
